COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHTS

SAN JUAN ISLANDS CONSERVATION DISTRICT

San Juan County, WA

The San Juan Islands Conservation District (SJICD) conducts of range of ecological forestry activities that begin with providing technical and financial assistance to landowners for forest management. SJICD has partnered with Western Washington University to develop the Islands Conservation Corps (ICC), a unique work-study program in the islands that allows students to obtain certificate- and master-level degrees while providing forest restoration services across public lands. The ICC has grown over the past three years and expanded partnerships, including with regional tribes to help steward public lands and reintegrate Traditional Ecological Knowledge in forest and fire management. NUESTRA CASA

Yakima County, WA

Founded in 2003, Nuestra Casa, is a Latin-led organization based in Sunnyside, WA. Through education, empowerment, and mutual support, Nuestra Casa enables immigrant women to create positive changes in themselves, their families, and their communities. Nuestra Casa assists over 1,000 immigrant adults yearly through classes, workshops, and referral services. Since 2019, Nuestra Casa has been expanding their portfolio of work, integrating wildfire preparedness efforts into their education program - and working with limited english speaking populations and renters to reduce potential ignition sources around homes. 








2022 ANNUAL REPORT
