COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHTS

ASOTIN COUNTY CONSERVATION DISTRICT

Asotin County, WA

The Asotin County Conservation District (ACCD) is pioneering a Forestland Stewardship Program to source local, high-quality woody materials for instream fish habitat enhancement projects. Reducing fuel loading through thinning and pruning increases fire-resiliency in the upland forests and improves the health of the watersheds below. ACCD then uses the harvested woody materials to construct in-stream habitat enhancement structures in project areas around Asotin County. LAKE WENATCHEE FIRE + RESCUE

Chelan County, WA

In the heart of the Cascade Mountains, near Leavenworth, Washington, Lake Wenatchee Fire & Rescue (LWFR) is leading efforts to better protect residents and property from potential impacts from wildfire. They are coordinating and implementing a wildfire risk home assessment program, and removing and chipping vegetation. In cooperation with UCSD and Localtel, LWFR has installed two live wildfire detection cameras to facilitate monitoring and early detection to support suppression efforts and earlier community notification. WAFAC's Member Connections program is designed to foster growth and pave the way for new, creative ventures for community fire adaptation leaders. Each mentorship group develops a unique working relationship as they discuss and decide what topics they want to delve into to learn about and then share with with FAC practitioners from around the state.

WAFAC ANNUAL WORKSHOP

OCTOBER 17-19, 2023 WENATCHEE, WA

62 local, state, and federal community fire adaptation practitioners gathered for three days to share best practices, receive training, and identify strategies for improving fire outcomes.

At the workshop, WAFAC members

- defined their community and what it means to work in service;
- highlighted ways to build community engagement and address environmental justice from a wildfire perspective; and
- dug into the root causes and key issues hindering progress in local community fire adaptation work, the first steps to removing these barriers, and potential solution pathways that best suit their unique communities.

The workshop concluded with field visits to learn about community and landscape fire recovery, cross-boundary fuel mitigation, and youth forestry education.
