



CWPP IMPLEMENTATION AND ACTION GROUPS

After a CWPP is finalized, the focus shifts from planning to action. Successful implementation depends on strong relationships. Implementation or action groups support collaboration and continuity in fire adaptation work by uniting local leaders, practitioners, residents, and partners around shared responsibility for wildfire risk and resilience.

Lessons Learned

Use place as an anchor. CWPP implementation should be tailored for what makes sense to your community.

Collaboration takes flexibility and compromise. Understand your shared goals, but also respect that each entity has its own individual needs and priorities. Strive for alignment, not absolute agreement.

Don't chase perfection. Aim for imperfect action over perfection and be ready to learn.
